Message from the President...

Tonight, I watched the nightly news as I do almost every night, but tonight's broadcast was special. David Muir introduced viewers to some of the brave men, who in their youth, waded into Hell on the beaches of Normandy. More than 150,000 young men risked their lives that day to begin the liberation of France and other European countries. Several of the D-Day survivors David Muir interviewed were packing to travel back to France to participate in the commemoration. These men, now in their 90s and some over 100 years old, will receive well deserved heroes' welcomes. I hope these men know how much we all owe them.



I am a year one baby boomer. When I was growing up practically all my friends' fathers were World War II veterans. We didn't think much about what our fathers, and in some cases mothers, had done. They put the war behind them and set about building wonderful 1950s lives for us. As adults, my sisters and I often joked that we grew up in "Leave It to Beaver" land.

Tonight, ten years after his death, I'm thinking about my father, Sgt. Robley Henson Tatum. He was not present on D-Day, but he fought across Europe in the Battle of the Bulge. Just think, one day he was a student walking the campus at Georgia Tech, and a few months later he was sleeping in a fox hole in Germany.

Daddy seldom mentioned the War, but occasionally he would tell us one of his war stories. One that I remember vividly was about a Christmas Eve when he was lucky enough to find shelter in a barn. Even inside the barn it was freezing. Daddy said he took out his fountain pen to write my mother a letter only to discover that the ink had frozen in his pen.

Years later my parents kept my son Kirk after school and during the summer. Daddy talked to Kirk about the War, and Kirk would tell me the stories. One day I asked Daddy, "Why didn't you tell us all the stories?" His answer... "You were girls. I didn't think you'd be interested." He didn't know how wrong he was.

Thank you, Daddy. I'm so proud to have been raised by an American hero. If you have veterans in your family, don't wait until it's too late to let them know how proud you are of them.

Sue DeVore Rainwater

One of Alpharetta's most admired ladies, Sue DeVore Rainwater passed away on April 16, 2024. Sue was a long-time member and supporter of the Historical Society. Her obituary is listed below. Obituary

Sue DeVore Rainwater passed away peacefully in her home on April 16, 2024. Sue was born and raised in Alpharetta, GA and was a lifelong member of the Alpharetta First Baptist Church. She attended Milton High School where she was crowned homecoming queen in 1959, her senior year. Sue married Lamar Rainwater in 1961 and they raised their two sons in downtown Alpharetta.

After working for a couple of companies in Atlanta, Vantress Farms and Ison Finance, Sue became a full-time employee of the City of Alpharetta in 1979, accepting the position as City Clerk. Sue served 4 mayors and countless council men and women during her 32 years in that position. As her career developed, she continued to advance her accomplishments, gathering a number of degrees and certifications from the University of Georgia to allow her to best serve her beloved city. Sue served the city for almost 50 years, including her volunteer time with the planning commission. After retiring in 2011, Sue was honored to receive the Lifetime Service Award from the Georgia Municipal Association. Sue also spent many hours during her career and after supporting and serving the Alpharetta Historical Society, a cause and organization very dear to her.

Sue spent her retirement years traveling and laughing with friends and family and occasionally spoiling her three grandchildren.

Sue was preceded in death by her husband, Lamar (1999); her son, Brent (2007); and her brother, Donald (2007). She is survived by her son, Kevin (Jenni); her three grandchildren, Haley (Jon), Maisie and Jake; her great-grandson, Bradley; her three nieces, Tara, Tena and Tammy; in-laws, cousins and dear friends, all of whom she cherished and loved deeply.

Rummage Sale



Appointments are made upon request. Please give us 24-hour notice.



Alpharetta Drug Store


There were no pharmacies in Alpharetta until around 1960, but there was a drugstore/soda shop that operated from the 1910s until 1959.

The soda fountain offered only drinks and ice cream at first, then starting in the 1940s, sandwiches became available. A grill was installed in the 1950s so that hamburgers, hot dogs, and grilled cheese sandwiches could be added to the menu. A juke box and pinball machine were added in the 1950s.

Non-food items offered for sale included patent medicines, toiletries, small household goods, magazines, writing instruments, paper goods, and small hardware items.


The business went through several owners and name changes, but for 50 years it was never moved from the 3 South Main Street building shown in the circa 1925 photos. The building still stands and is now the home of the Butcher and Brew restaurant.

The house featured as the *Out and About* for the last issue of the newsletter is located at 122 Marietta Street, just around the corner from Pure Taqueria on Roswell Street. It doesn't look at all the same now as in the photo because it has been converted into a hot new restaurant called TBB. Every day you will find it filled with folks who enjoy socializing and conversation with their friends.

The rest of the story is that it is now owned by the Sedgwick Restaurant Group who also own multiple restaurants in North Fulton like Pure Taqueria, 7 Acres BarNGrill, The Union, and Made Kitchen, as well as others in the Atlanta area. Chris and Michelle Sedgwick are the owners of

this very successful group of restaurants. The newest of these is TBB, which stands for Theo Brothers Bakery, on Marietta Street. The area around Pure on Roswell Street has become the home of this restaurant group. Pure opened in 2005 and the Rainwater house located at 119 Roswell Street next to Pure was renovated and now serves as headquarters for the Sedgwick Restaurant Group (SRG.) Michelle operates Theo Brothers Bakery in Crabapple and sells their bread at the Farmer's Market on Saturdays as well as managing TBB.

A very interesting project of Chris' is the garage located beside TBB that he has turned into a museum of sorts. It is full of 'garage' memorabilia (signs, tools, etc.) and home to Chris' collection of Kombis (those VW buses that have a pickup rear in place of the bus).

All About Buttons
Debbie Johnson, presenter





On Thursday April 18th, the society members, along with guests from the Chattahoochee Evening Stars Quilt Guild and the East Cobb Quilters' Guild, enjoyed a presentation on the history of buttons and button collecting by Debbie Johnson, Co-President of the Peach State Button Club. Debbie has been collecting buttons for 25+ years. She has three rooms in her house filled with buttons (approximately 9000) displayed on special cards. Her collection includes buttons made from materials as diverse as celluloid and vegetables. She has attended local, state, and national button conventions where she said, "there are women who will push you away to get a button they want." In the world of collectibles, buttons are the third most popular. Debbie also pointed out that, informally, most women in previous generations had a "button box." She also told us that buttons have been used since the 16th century. Debbie brought many of her beautiful button display cards and passed them around. Many people in the audience had questions and comments as they admired the buttons.
